Pastor's Column

Last night, waiting for sleep to come, I was thinking about this Lenten season and how it could be different, more spiritual, more honest. All I could think of was the oft quoted declaration: "Lent is a journey." That's got something to do with the journey Jesus takes as he preaches and teaches and heals his way to Jerusalem. What other way is there for Lent to be more spiritual than to think of the time in these days as if you are traveling with Jesus. Then, indeed, Lent is a journey, but what kind of journey?

I finally did get to sleep only to be interrupted by weird dreams, dreams which turned eventually into being wide awake with all the symptoms of the winter/snow related blahs, tiredness and even a little depression...what followed is way too much information for this public column. Needless to say, I hope the way the night turned out is no indication of my journey this lent.

As the music from our radio nudged me awake this morning, I remembered: Journey takes our feet a-walking; journey moves us; journey leads us to some destination; journey is the destination. Upright but steadying myself on the bedpost, I looked down from the window to the snow, snow melted and refrozen several times this week, and there were footprints frozen in the snow. Someone had trudged through the ice covered snow this way and that way--footsteps going back and forth, then over there and in no particular path. I couldn't imagine what kind of journey this person was on.

Looked like some of my Lenten journeys.

As sleep cleared from my eyes, I remembered: Those footprints tell the story of Pat's (my wife) shared journey with the birds and squirrels who reside in our yard. She has five or six bird feeders. She even feeds choice corn to four squirrels. I still don't get that. As a youth, my mom fed me squirrels. Yum! This journey with these lovely and interesting little creatures is one of Pat's great joys.

Even harsh weather never keeps her from showing hospitality to the cardinals, blue jays, woodpeckers, gold finches, et.al. **Our footsteps during this Lenten time tell the story of our journey!** I suppose the ultimate hope is that we will travel along in the footsteps of Jesus – from his journey from his baptism by John to 40 days in the desert, to the temple, to the garden in desperate prayer, to the hill called Golgotha, and ultimately to resurrection morning. For sure, the footprints we leave behind will tell the story of our shared journey this Lent. May the journey bring us—each of you and all of us—closer to the One who gives us the journey in the first place.

One Great Hour of Sharing

No Longer A Stranger

Each summer Glenview Community UCC in Illinois hosts Israeli and Palestinian teenagers in an attempt to break down barriers of hate and mistrust.

The Hands of Peace program began in 2002 when a Jewish mom and a Christian mom from Glenview, seeing how well their children played together despite their differences, wanted to do something about the Israeli-Palestinian conflict.

Preparing to celebrate its 10th year, the Hands of Peace Middle East Alumni Club hosted an alumni seminar in Jaffa, Israel, in the spring of 2012. Due in large part to funding received from One Great Hour of Sharing, the organization was able to bring together 33 former Hands of Peace participants, including Palestinians from the West Bank, Palestinian Citizens of Israel, and Jewish-Israelis. The students came from all over Israel and the West Bank to spend a weekend in this multi-cultural city located just south of Tel Aviv engaging in dialog and looking for ways to improve their shared future together.

In 2012, the Hands of Peace Summer Program continued its trajectory of growth by engaging seven Jewish-Israelis, seven Palestinians, four Palestinian citizens of Israel and 14 American teens in another intense and emotionally enriching two-week experience hosted in Glenview, Ill. Addressing the geographic, religious and cultural diversity issues that flavor the Israeli-Palestinian reality, the program once again witnessed a group of teenagers who progressed from anxious and wary strangers at the beginning of their time together, to crying and hugging friends when it came time to say goodbye.

For the second year, Summer Program participants produced videos on themes of peace that can be viewed at the Hands of Peace website — handsofpeace.org.

One Great Hour of Sharing supports Hands of Peace in its efforts to help teens explore peaceful coexistence and celebrates the program's efforts as it gears up for its 10th full program year in 2013!

Our Lenten Journey – "Transformation"



The word, "transformation," is popular these days. In <u>molecular biology</u>, "transformation" is the <u>genetic</u> alteration of a <u>cell</u> resulting from the uptake and expression of foreign <u>genetic</u> material (<u>DNA</u>). In information technology, "<u>data transformation</u>" is the "process of converting data from a source into a destination format." Psychologists speak of transformation as fundamental "change" in a person's emotional state or their personality. As we age, our bodies and minds are changed, transformed from one state to another, but what about our spiritual lives? Indeed, how is it with our souls these days? Is there some change we need to make? Are we floundering around in the dark and stress of our lives? **Are our spirits swirling without a direction?** This Lenten season, we will explore aspects of spiritual transformation and the impact such change has on our lives as disciples of Jesus Christ.

Pastor Hanberry's Approach to and Policy for Pastoral Care

Confidentiality in all communications with people in the church is my policy – always. In other words, "what is shared with me, stays with me."

If a person in the church is ill or in the hospital or going to have surgery, I will always ask, "what do you want me to share with the church about your illness, your surgery, etc., if anything?" I, of course, will honor your request and preferences.

Some folks prefer that their illness or a hospital stay be kept private. Others are more open to sharing with the congregation or desire prayers from the church community. I prefer to follow the wishes of the individual or family directly rather than responding to what one might call "hear-say." Folks in the congregation may share whatever they choose; however, my policy requires that I speak directly with the person or a primary family member before I share news about a person's life circumstances.

Please feel free to contact me at anytime via my cell phone (301-788-6546) to request a visit, to share a health issue or a pastoral care need. I will be in a good position to respond to your pastoral care needs as they arise.

CROP Walk-Ending Hunger One Step at a Time



Join walkers from northern Carroll County on April 6, 2014 for a 5 mile stroll to help end hunger. What is the CROP Walk? This is the largest charitable walking event in the United States, to help end hunger locally and abroad. Their roots are in feeding the hungry and their future is in ensuring sustainable access to proper nutritious food. Malnutrition leads to nearly half of all childhood death's before the age of 5. During a child's first 1,000 days proper nutrition is vital. Without it, the risk is high for a life long health issues like blindness, developmental disabilities and organ shut down.

So, join us as we walk from St. Paul's Lutheran Church in New Windsor, up route 75 to McKinstry's Mill Road and then head back to New Windsor. The walk is rather flat and St. Luke's Winter's Lutheran Church is a rest stop. If you can not walk, you can sponsor a walker. Each walker is to have sponsors to raise money for Church World Service. 75% of the money raised goes to Church World Service, 25% of the money stays in Carroll County. It will be divided between Carroll county Food Sunday, Shepherd's Staff and Access Carroll.

The Youth Group will be walking, so help support us in ending hunger!

St. Matthew's UCC Care-Giving Ministry

As a "family oriented congregation", the people of St. Matthew's UCC have responded to the needs, crises and struggles of its members, friends and neighbors for decades. We have done with an organized ministry through the Wellness Committee, work of our Parish Nurse, informal responses by our membership as needs arise, and through a full-time pastor providing varied forms of pastoral care. As time and circumstances change, however, so must St. Matthew's find ways to adapt to changing times and to grow in the process.

Two major shifts have recently occurred in our capacity to continue providing our members and friends with "caregiving" ministries:

- Our Wellness Committee has had to limit its direct care ministry of actively visiting our home-bound and nursing home-bound members; and
- Pastoral services have shifted from full-time to part-time (40%) which means the pastor now has limited time for personal visits.

As a result of our shifting to a part-time pastor, assistance from the lay membership of St. Matthew's will be needed to ensure that our various ministries remain vital and effective. To meet our changing needs, we would like the visitation component of the work done by the Wellness Committee to be conducted by a "new" care-giving team.

Pastor Gerry will meet with prospective team members to orient everyone to the program and to answer any questions. He will provide the level of training necessary to make each team member comfortable with his/her responsibilities. He has also volunteered to accompany each team member, if desired, on the first visit with your carerecipient. Although this ministry could require only an hour or so of your time each month, you may find that you enjoy spending more time than that with your care-receiver.

Those in other churches who have served as care-givers have said this about their experiences:

"It has helped me develop a deep personal relationship with my care-recipient."

"Meetings with my care recipient have developed into a deep friendship."

"Being a member of the Care-Giving Ministry has provided me an opportunity to ake a difference in another person's life at a very personal level."


